TOUR SUMMARY

This is a short and sweet trip designed to take in Baja's small suite of endemic birds, plus some world-class marine experiences, namely Whale Sharks and the world's most approachable Gray Whales. This trip went off without a hitch, and the whole group had a great time. The hotels were comfortable, roads mostly excellent, and the food was fantastic, especially the local seafood. Though some Americans are worried about visiting Mexico, this part of Mexico is incredibly safe, and with friendly local people. It's a great tour if you want to dip your toes into international birding, or if swimming with Whale Shark or being a couple feet from a Gray Whale are on your "bucket list"!

ITINERARY

February 24 Arrival in San Jose del Cabo. Night in San Jose.

February 25 San Jose Estero. Birding Miraflores, then drive to La Ribera. Night La Ribera.

February 26 Sierra de la Laguna. Drive to La Paz. Night La Paz.

February 27 Whale Shark snorkeling boat trip. Afternoon local birding. Night La Paz.

February 28 La Paz to San Carlos. Gray Whale boat trip. Night San Carlos.

February 29 Morning boat trip. Afternoon to El Pescadero. Night El Pescadero.

March 1 Morning desert birding. Drive to San Jose del Cabo to catch outbound flights.
